Letter from the DC Dental Society President Ladan Basiri, MA, DMD

Leadership and learning are indispensable to each other. — John F. Kennedy

Dear Colleagues,

This beautiful Spring, many people may not see the natural beauty of the season, as the world – especially the European continent – deals with the

third surge of this pandemic.

The news of the AstraZeneca vaccine's side effects has exacerbated the public and governments' vaccination hesitancy, as well as the vaccine's extant supply issues. The AstraZeneca recombinant vaccine has shown 79% efficacy with a single dose, it is cheap, is part of COVAX, and requires normal refrigeration temperatures. Many countries are not scheduled to have widespread vaccination until 2023, which is far too distant, threatening our collective safety and security – as they say, "We are not safe until we are all safe." According to recent statistics, only 13% of the population is vaccinated in the U.S. as virus variants are quickly spreading. The AstraZeneca vaccine is being tested to receive the EUA very soon here, and that would be another vaccine in our arsenal.

In D.C., our Society's efforts have not ceased. We sent a <u>letter to the Mayor's office</u> on January 29, and since we did not get any response, we sent another letter to both <u>Mayor Bowser</u> and <u>DC Health's director, Dr. Nesbitt</u>, on March 17, requesting that they grant emergency authorization for dentists to volunteer administering COVID-19 vaccines in public sites. We did receive a <u>response from Dr. Nesbitt</u> on March 25, stating that at this time they have sufficient number of vaccinators in the district!

Recently, President Biden took action to include dentists and dental students as

volunteer vaccinators in an effort to expand the pool of vaccinators as supplies increase around the country. Additional details on the announcement and eligibility to administer the vaccine can be found in this recent article from the ADA Morning Huddle. According to the article: "Volunteers must take an online vaccine training course and be observed by an experienced healthcare professional before administering vaccines (Each of the COVID-19 vaccines authorized so far are administered into muscle in the upper arm.) Current certification in basic cardiopulmonary resuscitation. While some states already per-mitted an expanded list of health professionals to give the vaccine, the new update applies to all states. The goal, according to the White House, is to: "Have enough vaccinators as the supply of doses continues to increase and all adults in the U.S. become eligible for vaccination by May 1. To make this change, President Biden ordered an amendment to the Public Readiness and Emergency Preparedness (PREP) Act Declaration—originally declared in January 2020 under President Trump—to authorize additional categories of qualified professionals to prescribe, dispense, and administer COVID-19 vaccines anywhere in the country. The amendment also includes retired health professionals. (Federal Register Notice 86 FR 14462)." The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) has launched an Online Vaccinator Portal so that people can check whether they are eligible to administer the vaccine. The portal also contains training links.

As of April 2, 23.0% of D.C. residents are partially or fully vaccinated, and total 343,430 doses have been administered. Ward 8 has the lowest percentage of vaccinated D.C. residents (7%), and Ward 3 has the highest (17%). Our hope is that the DC administration can utilize dentists' help to accelerate the vaccination effort during this public health crisis.

For those of you who missed our March business meeting, I reported that there is a new update from the DC Prescription Drug Management Program (PDMP) as follows: a new requirements took effect under the on March 16. All dentists who are licensed to dispense prescription drugs are required to register with PDMP. There is no change to this requirement. What is new is if you issue a prescription for an Opioid or Benzodiazepine medication for more than 7 consecutive days, you will need to query the PDMP. Similarly, you will be required to query the PDMP again every 90 days thereafter while the course of treatment or therapy continues. You will also need to query the PDMP prior to issuing a refill after 90 days. See page 4 for information on a webinar presented by the PDMP staff for DCDS on April 14 at 5:45 PM.

In the economic news there are several important dates for your information.

As reported in the Journal of Accountancy, the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) will not require small businesses that received a COVID-19 Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) to start making payments on the loan until 2022.

In a news release issued on March 19, the SBA announced extended deferment periods for all of its disaster loans, including the COVID-19 EIDL loans, with the deferral details differing depending on the calendar year the disaster loan was made. For all SBA disaster loans made in 2020, the first payment due date is 24 months, extended from 12 months, from the date of the note, while for all SBA disaster loans made in 2021, the first payment due date is 18 months, extended from 12 months, from the date of the note.

A forecast released Wednesday March 17, shows Fed officials now expect the economy to grow at a rate of 6.5% this year, up from 4.2% that was projected in December. Furthermore, the IRS appears to have decided to heed the pleas of lawmakers and advocacy groups who have been urging the tax agency to postpone this year's April 15 filing deadline until May 17.

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



Part One: Bonding Dental Ceramics

Part Two: Materials and Techniques to Improve Class II Composites

Class II composite restorations remain the bread and butter procedure of many general dentists. Although this procedure may seem trivial, there are many clinical factors which lead to a long-lasting restoration, including diagnosis, isolation, caries removal, cavity preparation, use of liner, matrix and wedge placement, bonding technique, composite placement, and finishing and polishing. This course aims to review the techniques for each of these steps based on current evidence.

- 1. Discuss treatment guidelines for interproximal caries and caries removal endpoints.
- 2. Discover materials and techniques to promote a long lasting adhesive bond and create a well-adapted restoration.

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Remembering Dr. L. Carole Richardson

It is with a heavy heart that we share news of the <u>passing of Dr. L. Carole Richardson</u>, a longtime member of the DC Dental Society and former chair of the DCDS Professional Standards Committee. The following text is adapted from the obituary published in The Washington Post on Mar. 24, 2021.

Dr. Richardson died peacefully at home in Kensington, MD on March 17, 2021, attended by her wife of 41 years, Carolyn Morrissey. Carole was 78 years old and suffered from Multiple System Atrophy (MSA).

Carole was born at home in Cisco, Texas in 1942. She attended Cisco Junior College and then Texas Woman's University, majoring in biology and intending to become a scientist. She worked for several years in research laboratories at M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston and at Georgetown University in DC. She decided to pivot into dentistry, and put herself through dental school in part by working at Dixie Liquor Store. She was one of two women in her Georgetown class of 140 dentists, earning a standing ovation at graduation. One of the very first women dentists in the DC metro area, Carole practiced general dentistry for 40 years, earning the love and respect of literally thousands of patients.

She was an active volunteer and supporter of numerous charitable organizations. At Mary's Center, she provided free dentistry. She served for three years on the Board of Cedar Lane Unitarian Universalist Church. She was proud to sponsor a women's softball team, the Masticators. She also served as Chair of the Professional Standards Committee of the DC Dental Society.

In addition to her wife Carolyn, she is survived by her brother Mark Richardson and sister-in-law Harriet Richardson and their family.

A celebration of Carole's life will be held in May at Cedar Lane Unitarian Universalist Church. No funeral service is planned. In lieu of flowers, memorial gifts can be made to Cedar Lane UU Church, 9601 Cedar Lane, Bethesda, MD 20814. The Cedar Lane community was an important part of Carole's life and is heavily engaged in social justice and environmental work that mattered deeply to her.

ADA President: New Law is Proof that Advocacy Works

After more than 600 meetings with lawmakers and a grassroots campaign involving more than 10,000 dentists, the Competitive Health Insurance Reform Act was signed into law in January, marking a victory for the dental profession and the public, ADA President Daniel J. Klemmedson, D.D.S., M.D., writes in Dental Economics. The law unravels an insurance antitrust exemption in the McCarran-Ferguson Act and is expected to improve transparency in the dental insurance marketplace, leading to healthier competition and coverage that works better for patients and dentists, Dr. Klemmedson writes.

Report: Dentists Strive for Tooth Preservation when Restorations Fail

ADA News reports that 4 out of 5 dentists say they repair defective tooth restorations, reflecting a move away from replacement when feasible, according to a report by the ADA Clinical Evaluators Panel published in the Journal of the American Dental Association. The report, based on a survey of 400 ACE Panel member dentists, found noncarious marginal defects as the leading restoration condition requiring repair, at 87%, followed by partial loss or fracture of the restoration at 79% and crown margin repair due to carious lesions at 73%. "The main takeaway is that there is a paradigm shift from aggressive tooth removal to tooth preservation," said co-author Juliana B. da Costa, D.D.S., a member of the ACE Panel Oversight Subcommittee of the ADA Council on Scientific Affairs.

ADA Calls for Reforms to Address Student Debt

ADA President Daniel J. Klemmedson, D.D.S., M.D., and Executive Director Kathleen T. O'Loughlin, D.M.D., congratulated Miguel Cardona on his confirmation as secretary of education in a March 30 letter. The letter also outlined Association priorities, and they called for swift action to improve federal student loan programs, according to ADA News. ADA priorities include protecting access to federal direct unsubsidized Stafford loans and Grad PLUS loans for graduate and professional degree students, lowering interest rates and fees on federal education loans, and limiting total accrued interest on federal student loans. The ADA also called for improvements to the Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program.

Secondhand Smoke Exposure Tied to Pediatric Urgent Care

Researchers found that children who were exposed to secondhand smoke were more likely to have had an urgent care visit over a one-year period, and their families were more likely to have incurred higher costs for that care, compared with those who did not have secondhand smoke exposure, HealthDay News reports. Research reported in PLOS ONE also found that children exposed to secondhand smoke were almost twice as likely to be admitted to the hospital as those without exposure to secondhand smoke.

Dental CT Scan Helped Resolve Patient's Inexplicable Symptoms

The New York Times reports that a 68-year-old patient who had reported fatigue, vertigo and tinnitus for years received treatment for such conditions as Meniere's disease and benign paroxysmal positional vertigo without relief. That changed when she visited her dentist, where a dental CT scan spotted a mass in the sinus behind her left cheek. Further tests resulted in a diagnosis of cholesteatoma, and two surgeries later, the patient reports that the worst of her symptoms are gone, although some issues remain.

Women Make Strides in Dentistry, HPI reports

The percentage of women in dentistry increased from 24.1% to 34.5% between 2010 and 2020, while the percentage of female dental school graduates rose between 2009 and 2019 from 46% to 50.6%, according to the ADA Health Policy Institute. The trends suggest dentistry will achieve gender parity in 2040, according to HPI Vice President and ADA Chief Economist Marko Vujicic, Ph.D. ADA News reports that the ADA is taking steps to promote diversity in the profession through offerings such as the ADA Institute for Diversity in Leadership program and career and financial tools shared through the ADA Accelerator Series. "The future of the dental profession depends on how well and how fast we prepare dentists who are women for leadership roles to carry the ADA forward as women become the majority of the profession," said ADA Executive Director Kathleen T. O'Loughlin, D.M.D.

Study Examines Predictors for T2D Risk Among Women

The likelihood of developing type 2 diabetes was three times higher among women who were either overweight or had obesity and had polycystic ovarian syndrome, compared with women with normal weight and PCOS, according to a study presented at the Endocrine Society's annual virtual meeting. Medical Dialogues reports that the findings were based on data from an analysis of 23 studies involving 319,780 women with and without PCOS.


